\$ KFA TREASURY NOTES \$BY TREASURER DUANE SUTTLES

Greetings from the vault of the KFA Treasury. The executive board of the

KFA met in regular session February 23rd, during the Officers School held in Lexington. Since many of you were not able to attend the meetings due to your participation in classes or inability to attend the weekend at all due to various reasons, I have chosen to report to you, the status of our current membership numbers and explain membership options that are available.

As of the February meeting, 422 Kentucky fire departments are currently paid members of the KFA. Of these 422, 54 are new, meaning they were not members in 2012. There are still 70 departments that regularly maintain their membership, but are behind on dues for this year. I feel

confident that these 70 members plan to remain in good standing; they are just running a little behind in sending in their membership application with payment of dues. This will leave us short only 8 member departments from our goal of 500. Those are great numbers. I see these figures as very positive because we are moving forward in numbers with nearly 60% of Kentucky fire departments as members of the KFA. To our friends that still need to send in their dues, remember our bylaws set December 31 as the due date for membership dues, making delinquent all departments not paid by that date. This could have an effect on those departments when it comes to membership benefits, such as our \$3000 accidental death and dismemberment insurance, so it's real important that departments attempt to remain up to date.

In addition to department memberships, the KFA also offers personal memberships for individuals at a rate of \$25 per year and Sustaining memberships for our commercial supporters at a rate of \$150 per year. More information on these alternative memberships can be found on the KFA website at www.kyfa.org . State fire school will be coming up in June and Therese Cheney, our vendor specialist for the annual vendor show, will be contacting potential sustaining members to share information on how to display your equipment and products at our vast Vendor Show.

NFPA's Commitment to the Fire Service: Partnerships & Public Education

In this my fourth and final article in the series NFPA's Commitment to the Fire Service, I will write about NFPA's extensive partnerships, services and public education programs.

Partnerships, Projects and Services...

NFPA partners with other fire service organizations to protect and promote the AFG and SAFER grant programs. NFPA was a key supporter of the successful D-Block legislation that won successful passage in the 2012 Congress with funding at \$13.5 Billion. We continue to work with all partner organizations to ensure proper funding for the "build-out" of a national system.

NFPA is now and has in the past worked with NIST, the IAFF, IAFC and many other organizations on staffing and deployment projects, including a high-rise project that will soon be completed.

NFPA partners with the IAFC, USFA and IFSTA to fund all tuition expenses for chief officers to attend the State and Local Government Senior Executive program at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government. NFPA provides the lion's share of the funding to support this program.

NFPA provides technical advisory support, training and educational services through our Regional Offices, Engineering, Public Affairs, Public Education, and Public Fire Protection Divisions. Further, NFPA's Washington, D.C. Government Affairs Office provides a focus for fire service issues in our nation's Capitol.

NFPA provides numerous research and publication services to support the fire service. These publications include the Annual Fire Fighter Death & Injury Reports, Fire Investigations Reports, Fire Data & Statistics Reports, NFPA Codes & Standards News, NFPA Journal Update, and the NFPA Journal to mention only a few.

NFPA maintains one of the most complete fire service libraries in the world.

NFPA was one of the founding sponsors of the Congressional Fire Services Institute and continues today as an active participant and supporter of the CFSI.

NFPA sponsors 16 membership sections, including the International Fire Marshals Association, the Fire Service Section, the Metro Fire Chiefs Association (a joint IAFC/NFPA Section), the Education Section, and the Wildland Fire Management Section.

Following the September 11 terrorist attacks, to further its goal of protecting our nation's first responders, NFPA made available its haz-mat response and protective ensemble standards – free of charge – to all fire service members.

Public Education

NFPA has been committed to public education since the creation of a division in the mid-1970s. The mission of the division is to eliminate fire deaths and injuries through effective public education programs and information. Our goals are to position the division as the primary source for fire and life safety information; continuously improve strategies to train the fire service; increase awareness of and involvement in Fire Prevention Week; and create a public awareness of NFPA and its fire and life safety messages.

NFPA has seven Public Education Advisors coordinating network members in each state and Canada. In the Central Region, NFPA has Meredith Hawes from Travers City, MI serving as the contact for the region.

Written testing information is available on the Ky IFSAC testing web site at http://www.kyffcert. com. Tests are given at the system office usually on the third Monday of the month. Each time you take the written test you must pay a \$15.00 charge. Contact Duane Suttles for more information about written test location and dates at 888-301-2946. REMINDER: Candidates must be at least 18 years of age and be a member of a Kentucky FD or a fulltime student of Fire Science at EKU or KCTCS to be eligible for firefighter testing. Candidates must bring state issued drivers license or ID card to skills testing site for positive identification and verification of age eligibility. Candidates under 18, may complete any of the written exams, and may certify to Haz Mat Awareness only. All Certifications are based on the Professional Qualification standards set forth by the NFPA for Firefighters, except Haz Mat, which is a Job Performance standard. Our accreditation is through the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress (IFSAC).

NEW LAW REQUIRES ADDITIONAL TESTING FOR ALL CAREER KENTUCKY FIREFIGHTER CANDIDATES

Versailles, KY – Beginning <u>January 1, 2013</u>, all career firefighter candidates will be required to undergo a physical abilty test.

The candidate physical ability test (CPAT) will be designed to assess a candidates' ability to handle the physical demands of fighting fires and shall include exercises that stimulate the most common tasks involved in fire suppression.

Exercises for the CPAT will include, but are not limited to: stair climbing, hose drag, equipment carry, ladder raise and extension, forcible entry, search, rescue, ceiling breach, and pull.

The Kentucky Fire Commission will charge a fee of \$125 for all out-of-state firefighter candidates participating in the CPAT. In-state participants will not be required to pay a fee.

Pike County Firefighters Association News

Well we here in Pike County have been extremely busy since January. Let me give you a little history in case you don't know what's been going on. On January 9th in the early morning hours the Shelby Valley Volunteer Fire Department got toned out to a structure fire, while enroute to the scene they were told there were probably people still inside the structure. And unfortunately there was still a family in the burning home and we lost 4 small children all under the age of 6 yrs old and their father, the mother escaped with severe burns to her body and had to be air lifted to UK burn center for a couple weeks. What makes it even worse is the fact that during the investigation they could not find any working smoke detectors anywhere in the house.

But as most things go in the fire service we learn from our tragedies and our experience's. I was contacted on January 17 by Assist Director Richard Peddicord with the Ky State Fire Marshal office and he advised me that he had made contact with Kidde Smoke Alarms and they were going to donate 250 smoke detectors to Pike County Firefighters Association for distribution to people in Pike County thru their local volunteer fire departments.

Now here is where we turn a tragedy into a great thing, I told Richard that we would be honored to assist in the distribution of the smoke detectors to our firefighters in Pike County. I just knew that the great bunch of firefighters that we have here in Pike County would just jump right on this and want to help the people in their communities. So we had a press conference with all 26 fire

departments in Pike County being invited along with Fire Marshal Swope. So we got 250 Kidde Smoke Detectors on Tuesday January 22 and we told every department to start a list of people needing and wanting smoke detectors in their homes, come back to us and we would give them a least 2 detectors for each house some would need 2 or 3 and some might not need but one or even none just fix what they got. I am proud to say that on Sunday 27th I gave out 175 Kidde Smoke Detectors to start being installed in their coverage area.

We picked up some more sponsors and we purchased 252 more with Kidde donating another 252 to the association for a total of 504 more. This was about a week ago and we are down to about 125 left and getting ready to order more. And we will continue to order them as long as I can get sponsors to pay for them. We will let you know the final count sometime near the end of this year.

The series of four articles titled NFPA's Commitment to the Fire Service that have been published in Smoke Signals II over the past several months offer only a sample of the services, projects and programs NFPA provides and sponsors for the fire service.

There is much that the fire official must consider before deciding which fire, life safety and building codes are best for his or her jurisdiction. NFPA 1, Fire Code™ has a long history of proven compatibility with all building codes used in the United States. Also, technical guidance for existing buildings is a critically important issue. In this respect, NFPA 1 and NFPA 101, Life Safety Code® are the industry benchmarks. However, there is more to consider than code compatibility and technical provisions. When a fire chief recommends the adoption of a fire and life safety code, the chief is entering into a professional partnership with that code writing organization. Therefore, it is equally important to know what that organization stands for and its history of commitment (or lack thereof) to your profession.

If each of these issues is carefully considered, I am convinced that fire service leaders throughout our nation will support the adoption of NFPA Codes and Standards.

Northern Kentucky Firefighters Association Honors Emergency Responders

Erlanger, Kentucky: Firefighters, Emergency Medical Personal and Good Samaritans were recently honored at the Northern Kentucky Firefighter's Annual Awards Banquet. These individuals and departments were nominated by their peers for going above and beyond this past year. These nominations were reviewed and recipients chosen by a panel made of citizens from the community.

The Emergency Medical Services Award went to Members of Petersburg Fire/EMS; Bill Birkle, Adam Casteel and Alex Fish along with members of Hebron Fire District; Ron Jones and Wayne Isaacs. These individuals received this award for their actions in saving the life a four year old boy who had been accidently hung in Petersburg.

The Meritorious Service Award is given to a citizen or citizens who have been instrumental in the saving of a life. This year's award was given to Kristina and Nehemiah Hickman, a sister and brother who were hauling water for their family when they heard someone yelling for help. This brother and sister quickly responded to the cries for help, finding a man lying in a yard suffering from an apparent cardiac arrest. They quickly called 911 and began CPR; they continued pro-

viding CPR to this stranger until EMS arrived taking over rescue procedures. If it were not for their efforts this stranger would have had any chance of survival. This victim is now home with his family enjoying his second chance at life thanks to Kristina and Nehemiah.

The Department of the Year Rescue Award / Liberty Mutual Award was shared this year by two neighboring departments for their efforts during the rescue of a pilot who crashed his small plane in southwestern Boone County. This award went jointly to the Bellview-McVille Fire Protection District and to Union Emergency Services.

Junior Firefighter of the Year is given to a youth between the ages of 14 and 21 who shows great potential in the fire service. This youth will promote growth within of his or her department's Junior Firefighter Program. This year this honor was awarded to Joshua Seitz of the Alexandria Fire District's Explorer Program. Joshua is the very first recipient of this award.

The Firefighter of the Year was awarded to Lieutenant Adam Bradbury of the Northern Pendleton Fire District. Adam was nominated by his department for the dedication and leadership he has shown to his community during last March's Tornado that tore through Adam's home along with the community of Peach Grove. After the tornado had passed severely damaging his house, Adam began to survey the damage to this community along with rendering first aid and searching for victims.

Legislative Report

To begin this article I first want to wish Woody the very best and hope all



goes well with him. Also I want to report that I spoke to Gerald almost every day of the session and he stayed on top of the issues. He kept us informed and advised us although he could not attend. As of Tuesday he was doing great and should be back if we have to attend a special session, now that is good news!

The bad news is that there could be a Special Session on Pension. This year's legislative session has been one of many turns that took different directions. For years the last days of the session have been hectic but this year seamed worse. As many of you know I have said that this is the worst session that I have attended and many important issues could never get heard. When they, both House and Senate, began the discussions on cooperating with each other and during the process both sides went back to the past sessions of attacking each other.

HB1 passed Tuesday with an amendment. During the discussions we were able to negotiate and took out the ability for fiscal court or city council to make any changes. Also we requested language to prevent any department from being required to follow old HB 44 requirements. We have been assured that NO change in that requirement (IF YOU WERE EXEMPT BEFORE YOU ARE EXEMPT NOW). All members of the Auditor's office and the bill drafter all agree that they wrote the language to comply. We had to lobby hard and work with all parties to keep Senator's Thayer's original language off this final version.

Now we have one (1) major issue that has not been resolved. SB 2 the pension legislation should be discussed during the veto session over the next two weeks. They have in the past passed legislation on the last 2 days but who knows what will happen.

SB 2

Your contacts with your legislators have had an enormous impact, those phone calls, emails

and personal contacts were instrumental in the Senate not amending HB 228, with the language from SB2. During a series of State & Local Government Committee meetings last week and this week in afternoon and evening meetings, our legislative friends have asked for you to keep up the pressure on SB 2.

As I am sure you are aware Governor Beshear has been meeting with House and Senate Leadership, with additional meetings possible over the veto period, to discuss pensions and funding. If public employees and retirees are to impact this process, as many additional calls as possible need to be made to Senate and House Leadership, as well as Governor Beshear. When legislators return home please contact them with the same simple message "funding for pension fix", no "cash balance" and for them to "keep the promise". Please remember the phrasing of the message is up to you, the suggested message is just that, a suggestion. The only thing that matters is that contacts are made with the Governor and Leadership, substance over style. A conversation with or a message to, a legislator from a voter in their district, trumps a radio spot by the opponents of public pensions.

Automotive Event Recorders

We are constantly getting questions with regard to automotive event recorders. While known by several different names, I am referring to cameras generally in-stalled on the windshield of a vehicle with 2 lenses, 1 facing out and 1 facing the driver. The cameras record consistently and sense changes in G forces saving the video before and after the G force event. Depending on the manufacturer and model, some retain all of the video and bookmark the events while others only re-tain events. Again, various models may also retain speeding events, record GPS with the video, record speed, and do a variety of other functions.

Another variation is managed or self-managed systems. The companies providing managed services have cameras which automatically send event images to a re-view center. Their employees analyze the event and forward the video with an evaluation of what occurred and suggestions to coach the driver or other remedia-tion techniques to prevent recurrence. With the selfmanaged systems, the camer-as are physically checked by management on a regular basis and if they indicate events have occurred, the media card is removed and reviewed locally. There is also a hybrid system available which electronically sends videos directly to man-agement for review. Each of these systems has advantages and disadvantages and you need to find the system that works best for your organization, however re-member the managed systems also carry a monthly fee for monitoring.

Event recorders were originally designed to capture crashes in an effort to help determine fault and more quickly adjust insurance claims. Shortly after they be-gan being installed, fleet managers noticed that fewer accidents were occurring. Drivers were aware that the camera would capture every quick start, hard brake, sharp turn, and speed bump taken at 20 MPH. As a result, they began to drive bet-ter, avoiding issues which would cause an event on the camera. Another benefit of this is maintenance costs. When drivers operate their vehicles more efficiently, brakes and tires last longer and fuel consumption is reduced.

These items alone can recoup camera costs fairly quickly and also remember that fewer claims can help reduce future insurance costs.

The bottom line is that these recorders provide a great boost to your safety pro-gram. They have proven themselves as an excellent means to manage emergency vehicle safety while reducing operating costs.

For further information on event recorders, check with your insurance provider. Many providers can not only provide information but may also be able to assist in discounted pricing.

The International Association of Fire Chiefs and the National Volunteer Fire Council have announced that behavioral health will be the focus of this year's activities during the 2013 International Fire/EMS Safety and Health Week, to be held June 16-22.

Fire departments are encouraged to suspend all non-emergency activity during Safety and Health Week to focus on safety and health training and education, allowing all shifts and personnel to participate. An entire week is provided to ensure each shift and duty crew can spend at least one day focusing on these critical issues.

Saving Our Own...An Inside Job

This year's effort will capture the importance of responders looking out for their own and each other's mental and physical well-being. This year's tag line, Saving Our Own...An Inside Job, reflects the focus on the theme of behavioral health and the understanding that the most important factor in improving responder health and safety is other

responders.

National and international organizations have been focusing on behavioral health issues for the past several years, but they are still taboo in many departments. Safety and Health Week is an opportunity to start moving discussion, action, and resources to the local level.

"Addressing behavioral health issues can only be done when we first acknowledge there is a problem, and we've been in collective denial as an industry for too long," said IAFC President Hank Clemmensen. "Our responders are under unprecedented pressure, and it's time we have some unprecedented conversations about how that impacts our health."

"The mental and emotional well-being of our first responders is as important as their physical health," said NVFC Chairman Philip C. Stittleburg. "It is time we recognize that these issues have a critical impact on health and safety, and ignoring this puts our personnel at risk. The fire service community needs to understand these issues and remove the barriers to meeting the behavioral health needs of personnel."
