
William Swope Jr. Appointed as **State Fire Marshal**

Wednesday April 16 Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet Secretary Robert D. Vance

announced the appointment of a veteran Lexington firefighter William Swope Jr. to serve as State Fire Marshal.

Swope served for 23 years in the Lexington Division of Fire and Emergency Services. Since 2002, he was the division's chief of administration, directing day-to-day administrative operations, including compensation, benefits and payroll. He also performed duties relating to health and safety and personnel.

From 1995 to 2000, Swope served in the fire prevention bureau, where he supervised field inspectors and conducted public education programs.



As State Fire Marshal, Swope will serve as director of the Division of Fire Prevention. The agency's duties include investigating the cause and origin of fires. The division also conducts inspections of public buildings for compliance with fire and life safety codes, and inspects manufactured housing, electrical systems, elevators and boilers. The State Fire Marshal's staff also licenses fire alarm systems and regulates hazardous materials.

The Division of Fire Prevention is part of the Office of Housing, Buildings and Construction in the cabinet's Department of Public Protection.

Fire Marshal Swope is looking forward to seeing you at State Fire School on opening day.

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Notes From The President's Desk John Daley

I'm sure everyone is looking forward to summer as much as I am with the coming of warm weather, outdoor training, vacations, picnics, swimming and baseball. Since our last edition of "Smoke Signals" we have been extremely busy.

First and foremost was the 2008 regular legislative session of the Kentucky General Assembly that concluded in mid April. I want to sincerely thank our KFA Lobbyist Mike "Howdy" Kurtsinger and Gerald Stewart who were on the job in Frankfort throughout the session. Our interest could not have been represented by two more knowledgeable and respected individuals.

In the tough political climate that permeated Frankfort, we proposed, reviewed, investigated, analyzed and scrutinized over 100 bills. We made valiant attempts toward the adoption of House Bills 427 and 503 which would have increased funding for our full-time paid firefighters, volunteer departments and fire districts. Unfortunately, we came up short but laid the foundation for future success in these areas. We addressed issues like enhanced firework safety laws and elimination of state fuel taxes for fire departments only to be rebuffed again. But we must keep trying and we will realize success in the future.

Passage of House Bills 389 and 475 will enhance the state fire service through an identification card process and improvements in the tracking of our fire incident reporting (KYFIRS) program. Our new firefighter license plates have been available since early 2008 and are one of the most appealing specialized plates available throughout the country. The passage of Senate Bill 135 will enable us continued success in this program.

The pension bills, the state budget bill, and HB 293 relating to fire district annexation were other areas that required constant vigilance. Our influence prevented catastrophic results for the fire service. Our lobbyist have vowed to make their mission a 365 day a year job and work with our rank and file throughout the coming year to be better prepared to present and pass vital fire and emergency service legislation in upcoming sessions.

For the second consecutive year I had the distinct pleasure to represent the KFA in Washington D.C. during Congressional Fire Service Institute events April 2-4. Vice-President Randy Courtney and Past President Troy Newcomb also attended as well as our National Volunteer Fire Council representatives Ken Knipper and Bryant Stiles. We along with nearly 30 other fire and emergency service representatives from Kentucky lobbied our congressmen and senators on federal legislative matters affecting the fire and emergency service. It is once again State Fire School time and I want to encourage every firefighter and emergency responder throughout the state to make the trip to Lexington in June. The past couple of years have seen great growth within this school. With the partnership of the Ky. Office of Homeland Security the training opportunities have been vastly expanded. The opening session on Thursday morning has been enhanced to provide training credit. A first rate exhibit area is provided to meet your departments purchasing needs. Classes are provided at various time intervals to meet the schedules of paid and volunteer firefighters. Please plan to attend, learn, and network with the fire service of Kentucky in Lexington, June 12 – 15.

I want to remind every fire department in the state of the newest of many benefits in belonging to the KFA. Through your modest dues payment, each and every member of your department is eligible for the \$2,000.00 accidental death and dismemberment benefit through American Income Life Insurance Company. Although the benefit is small and we hope no one will ever have to receive it, belonging to the KFA should be imperative to your fire department's mission. We are here to help you in whatever way possible and this benefit is just one more small way of assistance.

Whether it is legislation, training, or any other benefit and service the KFA offers, the cost of operations are expensive. We continually look for ways to finance the KFA while keeping department/member dues at a minimum. MY TRIP TO THE "HILL" 2008

Having recently returned from attending the 20th Annual Fire and Emergency Services Dinner, seminars, and events sponsored by the Congressional Fire Services Institute (CFSI) in Washington D.C., I think it is important to convey my feelings, findings, and opinions of this recent trip. Approximately 40 individuals from Kentucky were in attendance at various times and events. Attendee's representing the Commonwealth ranged form representatives of the KFA and our National Volunteer Fire Council reps, KPF, Fire Commission, Fire Chief's Association, Office of Homeland Security, local politicians and fire board members.

Whether you are a firefighter, emergency services responder, manufacturer or fire service leader, the United States Congress is more aware of your concerns because of the Congressional Fire Services Institute (CFSI). Established in 1989 as a nonprofit, nonpartisan policy institute, CFSI is designed to educate members of Congress about the needs and challenges of our nation's fire and emergency services so that the federal government provides the types of training and funding needed by our first responders.

With the spotlight on the fire service for the few days we are in Washington, your Kentucky delegation makes every effort to individually meet with each Kentucky congressman to discuss the fire and emergency service needs. These meetings were scheduled by KAFC President Rick Larkins and scheduled for all day Thursday.

Items listed for discussion were a compilation of initiatives from the International Association of Fire Chiefs legislative hot sheet, priorities of the National Volunteer Fire Council, and issues of local importance. The issues were: 1) Continuation and appropriate funding of the Assistance to Firefighters Grant and SAFER Grant programs 2) Continued support and funding for the US Fire Administration and the National Fire Academy 3) Volunteer Firefighter and EMS Personnel Job

Protection Act (H.R. 1643 / S. 2240) Requirement for IP-enabled voice services (cell phones) to provide 9-1-1 service (H.R. 3403 / S. 428 5) Tax incentives for retrofit of Fire Sprinkler Systems (H.R. 1742 / S. 582) and necessity of residential fire sprinkler systems 6) Extend Volunteer Incentive Protection to 2015 through support of Heroes Earnings Assistance and Relief Tax Act of 2007 (H.R. 3997) and address current issue of IRS audits on firefighter benefits including uniforms, vehicles and cell phones 7) Oppose planned legislation from the insurance industry regarding prohibition of third party billing for accident response service fees from fire or emergency response agencies 8) IRS tax code changes to enable implementation of LOSAP 9) Continued pressure of Dept. of Justice to properly and swiftly implement the Hometown Heroes Survivor Benefit Program. Last year this program was at a stand-still and we made our feelings known on this issue loud and clear. Through the work of our Representatives and Senators, gains were made and many cases were viewed, reviewed, and settled. The work of the Kentucky fire service and the Kentucky congressional delegation has received national credit for addressing and promoting this cause leading to fair and impartial settlements.

Early Thursday the Kentucky fire service delegation traveled to the US Capitol for our first meeting of the day with Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell. After our most gracious and productive meeting with Senator McConnell, we moved to our meeting location of last year, the Rayburn office building which house offices for United States Representatives. Here we met throughout the day with our congressmen or their staff representatives and presented our agenda. Throughout the day seminars were held featuring members of Congress, administration officials and national fire service officials who addressed a number of current federal initiatives. Unfortunately, due to our tight schedule we were not able to attend most of these informative sessions.

With a successful trip nearly concluded, all that remained was an early morning flight home from Reagan International. To our surprise, Congressmen John Yarmuth from Jefferson Co. was booked on the same flight.

Changes to IFSAC Testing Methods

IFSAC requires that its accredited entities certify to the current NFPA Standard. This year we must undergo a re-

accreditation visit. That means we will be required to bring our testing methods up to current NFPA standards. Therefore, Kentucky will continue to test firefighters to the current accredited standards until September 1st, 2008. September 1st will be the transition date, and we will begin to test firefighters to the new standard in effect at that time. What this means is all written and skills testing will utilize updated skill sheets and test banks after September 1st, 2008. These updated skill sheets will not be available for publishing until after July 1st, 2008. They will be published on the Area 9 and KFA websites as soon as they are available. KENTUCKY'S NEW "ATV SAFETY & RESCUE TRAINING PROGRAM" TAKES DELIVERY OF NEW OFF ROAD RESCUE EQUIPMENT

Knott County, Kentucky April 7, 2008

Unfortunately, **Kentucky continues to lead the nation in ATV fatalities.** However, a group of dedi

cated professionals are working hard to change that fact.

So, on a cold, wet and windy early spring Saturday morning in the mountains of southeast Kentucky, instructors from Kentucky Department of Agriculture's proposed new "ATV Safety & Rescue Training Program" and Kentucky State Fire-Rescue Training gathered with members of several volunteer fire-rescue agencies, to participate in the first ever "ATV Safety & Rescue R&D Weekend." The purpose of this gathering was to better understand what ATVs and UTVs used in the program could do, and perhaps more importantly, what they could not do. The site for this gathering of emergency personnel and off-road rescue equipment was the new "KNOTT COUNTY ATV SAFETY TRAINING CENTER" at the Sutton Memorial Park. located near the community of Vest, KY.

As the weekend itinerary commenced, the first event was presentation of an All Terrain Res-Q Trailer for use in the training program's ATV Safety & Rescue classes planned to be taught to emergency responders statewide. Mr. Dale Dobson, program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Agriculture's "Farm and Home Safety Training Program" accepted the off-road rescue trailer from Mike Brady, of ///EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT, the master distributor for All Terrain Res-Q. Brady stated:

"With 64 of these life saving off-road rescue trailers now serving in 26 US states, All Terrain Res-Qs are literally saving lives Coast to Coast, and then some!"

Participating in the ATV Safety and Rescue R&D Weekend were management and staff of the Knott County ATV Safety Training Center, instructors from the KDA Farm & Home Safety Program and Kentucky State Fire - Rescue Training, representatives of ///EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT, the flight crew of LifeNet MEDEVAC helicopter service, members of LaRue County Fire & Rescue, Hazard Fire & Rescue, Ball Creek VFD, Salyersville Fire & Rescue's "Rhino ResQ Team" and personnel from the newly formed Grapevine - Chavies VFD "ATV Rescue Team." In all, over a dozen volunteer rescue personnel utilized ten 4X4 ATVs and UTVs, plus four "All Terrain Res-Q Trailers" during the two-day learning experience.

While the R&D weekend's stated purpose was to better understand what ATVs and UTVs used in the program could do, and could not do, the first day's focus appeared to be on the latter. Judgingsurface conditions and water depth, plus

rigging/winch operations were just a few of the critical skills required. As off-road rescue team personnel are often dispatched to areas like these, response vehicles must be properly equipped the handle them. After evaluation, lessons learned, and procedures developed in this environment, will be added to the new program's curriculum.

As the weekend came to an end, everyone involved agreed "This was one of the most productive training events any of them had been involved in!"



Campbell Hausfeld Recalls Air Compressors Following Fires

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with the firm named below, on January 31 announced a voluntary recall of the following consumer product. Consumers should stop using recalled products immediately unless otherwise instructed.

Name of Product: Campbell Hausfeld and Husky

Air Compressors **Units:** About 233,000

Importer: Campbell Hausfeld, of Harrison, Ohio **Hazard:** Protective covers on the compressor's motor are not made from proper flame retardant material and can ignite, posing a fire hazard to consumers.

Incidents/Injuries: The firm has received 11 reports of fires. No injuries have been reported.

Description: The recall involves the following Campbell Hausfeld and Husky brand air compressors: 8-15 gallon Model # HL410100, HL421000, HL421500, HL431500. The first 4 digits of the serial # indicate a date code from 7/2005 (0705) through 3/2007 (0307). 4 gallon capacity Model #

HL5402 the serial numbers have a prefix of HY, KB or HU followed by a date code from 11/2006 (1106) through 11/2007 (1107). The model and serial numbers are located on the back of the tank.

Legislative report April 2008

To begin this report I must thank all of you who helped to put the fire service first! When we asked for your help you responded by making calls or by



talking to others and asking them to make calls. Many even talked to their legislator face to face back home. Thank you to those of you who helped, I will not mention names so I don't forget and leave someone out, you know who you are. Also I need to mention those who where in Frankfort everyday working hard for the interest of the entire fire service; they where Gerald Steward (KFA), Bruce Roberts (KPFF), Mark Blankenship (KPFF) and Jack Reckner (KAFC). The Fire Service owes each of these individuals a great big thank you for their time and help during this session!

I have spent the past four months in Frankfort discussing legislative issues on behalf of the fire service. As in the past the first and most important issue is not to lose any benefits, safety issues or fire service issues we have in place today.

During the session we were able to change or defeat legislations that would have had negative effects on the fire service. Several members do not know that there where different pieces of legislation that we negotiated over. One issue was the expansion of fire districts. HB 293 began as a piece of legislation to stop the expansion of fire districts but would have made it impossible to expand or even decrease fire districts. After discussion with the sponsor and his County Judge we made the comprise legislation that all departments involved sign off on the changes.

Another was HB 439 the fireworks legislation. Although we did not pass this bill this time we had very important discussions on safety with fireworks, we plan to talk a lot more about this in the future.

Plus we had a very aggressive agenda looking for more money for SFRT to provide more training, fireworks legislation, Chapter 75 increase in funding and pension legislation.

Those of us who have been here awhile have never seen a session like this one. So much political bickering and not much accomplished. There were 256 Senate Bills, 281 Senate Resolutions, 775 House Bills and 265 House resolutions that we watched, not many passed.

We did pass the following:

- Firefighter licenses plate legislative (SB 135) late on the last day at 11:22 PM Tuesday.
- Volunteer ID program (HB 389) to be administrated by the fire commission.
- HB 475 Incident reporting move from the Fire Marshal to the Fire Commission.
- HB 293 required that before a department can expand into another district both parties must have an agreement! This was not our legislation but a compromise from another piece of legislation!

I guess when you consider how many bills passed we were above the average and had important discussion of fireworks, budget and pensions! We could not pass more money for SFRT because of budget cutbacks, anything on pension reform or fireworks legislative. These issues and many others important to us as firefighters and the state of Kentucky as a hole failed because of the political bickering. Chapter 75 changes on taxing district increases failed to get a vote. We need to continue to work on these issues to move the fire service forward and the only way we will is to work together!

Again thanks for all the help all members of the fire service gave during this year's legislative session!

Last year it was announced that the Department of Transportation was establishing a 26 member Council that would advise the Federal Interagency Committee of EMS (FICEMS) and the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA) on all matters regarding EMS. The first meeting was held on April 24th and 25th. The group set a rather aggressive agenda and expressed a solid commitment to offer the agencies they will advise a flow of information and ideas to help them properly address EMS programs.

Last week there was another meeting of the "EMS Workforce for the 21st Century" stakeholders. This group is directing its attention to the recruiting and retention and health and safety issues that are necessary to assure a needed and quality EMS workforce. They have completed a draft document that will be released soon that looks at individual issues affecting the EMS workforce. Since a large amount of pre-hospital EMS is provided by fire departments, this report will also be of great interest to them.

I again remind those departments that provide EMS to review and comment on the latest draft of the EMS Education Standards. It is very important


